Te Arawa Declaration

- E whakamana tonutia ana e Te Arawa ngā mātāpono o Te Tino Rangatiratanga me te Mana Motuhake mā o tātou uri.
- Te Arawa affirms the principles of Tino Rangatiratanga and Mana Motuhake for our peoples.
- E ākina ana e Te Arawa te karanga a te Kīngitanga kia tapatahi te iwi Māori.
 - Te Arawa support the call of the Kiingitanga for Kotahitanga/unity.
- E tū kotahi mai nei a Te Arawa me Tūwharetoa; Mai Maketu ki Tongariro.
 - Te Arawa and Tuwharetoa support each other; Mai Maketu ki Tongariro.

Ngā Whakataunga Korero a Te Arawa

Te Arawa Statements:

- 1. Ko te Rangatiratanga me te Mana Maori Motuhake o Aotearoa kai ngā hapū me ngā iwi.
- Aotearoa belongs to hapū and iwi under our Tino Rangatiratanga and Mana Māori Motuhake.
- 2. E tohutohu ana ki ngā mema paremata Māori kia whakahē noa ai ngā tukanga a te Kawanatanga o te wā me ngā Kawanatanga hou, kei reira te tūtohu nui kia whakakore, kia whakarerekē rānei i tō ngā whānau, ngā hapū whakamau ki ōna tātai heke, i ōna tātai tiketike, i ōna tātai motukore, i ōna haepapa, i ōna mana, i ōna taonga tuku iho hoki.
- We direct all Māori MPs to oppose any legislation, under this Government and any Government hereafter, which proposes to extinguish or redefine our intrinsic, enduring and inviolable duties, responsibilities, rights and interests as whānau, hapū, iwi.
- 3. Inā hoki te Kawanatanga he aro ki te tutetute i ngā whakataunga toitū, i ngā haepapa, i ngā mana me ngā tikanga tuku iho hoki o Te Tino Rangatiratanga me te Mana Māori Motuhake, me tika tonu te whakatau a te Kawanatanga i ōna tono ki ngā whānau, ki ngā hapū, ki ngā iwi hoki nā rātou tonu te whakataunga whakamutunga ki te whakaae, ki te whakahē rānei.
- Where Government seeks to interfere with the guaranteed duties, responsibilities, rights and interests of Tino Rangatiratanga and Mana Māori Motuhake, the Government must disclose its proposals immediately to whānau, hapū, and iwi, whose decision to accept or reject will be final.

- 4. Ko te whakataunga whakamutunga ki ngā take katoa e hāngai mai nei ki tō rātou rangatiratanga, ki ō rātou whenua, ki ō rātou ngahere, ki ō rātou wai, ki ō rātou awa, ki ō rātou taonga tuku iho, katoa katoa, he mana motuhake nā ngā whānau, ngā hapū me ngā iwi.
- The final decision on all matters arising from the protection of their ways of life, lands, forests, waters and waterways, and taonga kātoa rests exclusively with whānau, hapū, and iwi.
- 5. Ko te oranga pāpori, wairua, ōhanga, me te taiao o ō mātou tāngata me te taiao he kawenga taketake, he mea nui hoki mā te whānau, ngā hapū, me ngā iwi, e kore e taea, ā, e kore e whakaaetia kia whakaitihia anō e te Karauna.
- The social, spiritual, economic and ecological wellbeing of our people and te taiao is a fundamental and paramount responsibility of whānau, hapū and iwi that the Crown cannot and will not be allowed to further diminish.
- 6. Ka tautoko mātou i ngā hapū me ngā iwi e whakawhirinaki ana i ngā kōti hei tikanga whakahere i te Kāwanatanga i ōna ake paerewa tukanga tika me te ture.
- We support all hapū and iwi who resort to the courts as a means to hold Government to its own standards of due process and the rule of law.

- 7. I roto i ngā kaupapa matua kua tāutuhia e te Kāwanatanga o nāianei, kei te whakaatu a Te Arawa i ōna anō āwangawanga ki ngā whakatumatuma ki tō mātou anō oranga.
- Amidst the current government's identified priorities, Te Arawa expresses concern about direct threats to our well-being.
- 8. Ka whakapau kaha a Te Arawa ki te whakahē i ngā whakaaetanga whakakotahi me te mahere kotahi rau rā; ā, ka whakapau kaha ki te whakahē i ngā mahere whai mana e takahi mai ana i ā mātou tikanga me tō mātou mana motuhake.
- Te Arawa strongly condemns coalition agreements and the 100-day plan; and commits to opposing future plans that undermine our customary rights and our Mana Maori Motuhake.
- 9. Ka whakapūmau a Te Arawa i tōna tautoko i ngā porotū, i a Toitū Te Tiriti me ētahi atu mahi, hei whakaatu atu i te pakari me te kaupare i te Kāwanatanga, hei tiaki anō i o mātou mana, me ō mātou whenua o Te Arawa.
- Te Arawa affirms support for Toitu Te Tiriti protests and any other groups' actions, expressing readiness to
- collectively act against the Government to protect our Te Arawatanga.

- 10. He mahinga tēnei ki te whai whakaaetanga, hei whakatutuki ake i ngā whakaritenga whakahaere i ā mātou tikanga iwi taketake.
- This gathering is open to proactive action when needed to safeguard our customary rights exercised in accordance with Tikanga Maori.
- 11. Ka whakaarohia ngā momo mahi katoa, ngā mahinga i te onamata, e taea ai te ārai ngā whakatumatuma
- ka kitea ki te anamata. Ko ngā momo katoa ka whakamanahia, hei pakari ake i ngā uauatanga ka rangona.
- All forms of action are considered, having been utilised in the past and deemed useful for future threats. All forms are legitimate in countering the challenges we face.
- 12. Ka whakamanahia te rangatahi hei rangatira e Te Arawa, ā, ka whakapau kaha ki te tautoko me te whakarangatira i a rātou, i o rātou mahi katoa.
- Te Arawa recognizes the leadership of rangatahi and commits to supporting and uplifting them in future action.

Outcomes of the NICF Strategic Wananga 1 February 2024, Kerikeri & Update 22 February 2024



Introduction

- 1. The 77 Iwi of the National Iwi Chairs Forum acknowledge the mana motuhake of each Iwi.
- 2. All Iwi in attendance at the National Iwi Chairs Forum on 1 February 2024 unanimously supported the outcomes from Turangawaewae and Ratana last month. And will support the upcoming hui at Waitangi.
- 3. This presentation outlines 11 kaupapa from the National Iwi Chairs Forum on 1 February 2024 that were provided to the Prime Minister and relevant Cabine Ministers on 2 February 2024. These kaupapa will be challenged through targeted legal action (including support for existing legal action), direct protest and other action.
- 4. These 11 kaupapa are a response predominantly to (1) the current governments Coalition Agreements and the governments 100 day plan and (2) the implementation of that 100 day plan which is view as a breach of He Whakaputanga and Te Tiriti o Waitangi.

Land-Locked Land

Background

Waitangi Tribunal Inquiry – Wai 2180 Taihape (Mōkai Pātea)

Mōkai Pātea rohe is made up of the tribal estates of Ngāi Te Ohuake, Ngāti Whitikaupeka, Ngāti Tamakōpiri and Ngāti Hauiti. Landlocked land affects Maori Land throughout the country but there are unique circumstances to the Mōkai Pātea situation.

Of the retained Maori Lands of those estates 74% is Landlocked, they are landlocked by distances measured in kilometres and they are landlocked by land-owners of the big high country stations of central Te Ika a Maui all of which figure in the 50 largest private land-owners of Aotearoa ie are well resourced and influential in maintaining the status quo.

Land-Locked Land

Current Situation

- The Waitangi Tribunal released its Landlocked Lands Report on 18th January 2024 He Whenua Karapotia, He Whenua Ngaro. The Tribunal found extensive loss and prejudice to Mōkai Pātea arising from Crown acts and omissions which had consistently failed to provide for adequate access to Māori land, and had in fact taken steps to improve its own Crown access across private land without due regard for supporting Mōkai Pātea landowners.
- The Report recommends a significant contestable fund to be established by the Crown, to be jointly administered between the Crown and the claimants by way of a "Landlocked Land Access Commission" (or similar name), the funding to be applied to planning (including feasibility), construction and maintenance of access roads to alleviate the landlocked state of the whenua. The Tribunal recommends that "The entity must also partner with Māori of the Taihape inquiry district, and its core purpose must be to actively protect the tino rangatiratanga of Māori owners over their landlocked land."
- The four Iwi of Mōkai Pātea are currently in settlement negotiations with the Crown including this Landlocked Land kaupapa. There are also 'Business as usual' initiatives leveraging off these negotiations centred on Te Puni Kokiri and other Government departments and Agencies.
- In terms of the wider application of this Commission/contestable fund model to iwi generally, the Tribunal notes that the Taihape model could be a pilot for the Crown's approach to unlocking land generally, but the Tribunal is careful not to go further given that they are confined to the inquiry area.

- 3. Disunity need empowered institution(s) to unify and act








What is proposed?

Unity has always been a problem...

Instructions of Lord Normanby, British Secretary of State, to William Hobson, August 14, 1839.

"Her Majesty's Gov[ernmen]t have resolved to authorise you to treat with the Aborigines of New Zealand for the recognition of Her Majesty's Sovereign authority over the whole or any parts of those Islands which they may be willing to place under Her Majesty's Dominion [acknowledging that the Aborigines] "title to the soil and to the Sovereignty of New Zealand is indisputable, and has been solemnly recognised by the British Gov[ernmen]t."

Furthermore, "we acknowledge New Zealand as a sovereign and independent state so far at least as is possible to make that acknowledgement in favour of a people composed of numerous dispersed and petty tribes, who possess few political relations to each other, and are incompetent to act or even deliberate in concert."

- Kotahitanga and the unification of our people which will allow us to act on the two additional proposed issues raised by
 Helmut Poverty and Constitutional Convention plus anything else we want to do.

Our agreed way forward from here

- 1. Return to our whānau / hapū / iwi to discuss these issues to build a shared understanding, belief, and determination to unite and move forward together!
- 2. Shared Comms including calendar of events where further wananga and discussions on these and related matters are being held.
- **3. Hui Taumata** to be held at the end of May, hosted by Ngāti Kahungunu (to follow the scheduled 1 May NICF hui) to make concrete decisions for actioning our kotahitanga. Panui to follow.

1. Coms

- We need to re-educate and re-discover what Tino Rangatiratanga means now.
- Ensuring the education of our rangatahi and having our own space as a priority
- Communications Collective around the rangatahi and pakeke how we communicate out with everyone, and how we resource this, and how we use the right language to make it understandable to te katoa.
- NICF support the establishment of a coms collective (establishing a coms unit articulating korero in a palatable way) Coms for Whanau Hapu Iwi ACTION to make this a resolution at Tauranga NICF
- **Principle of Action** Communications maintaining, controlling the narrative and directing the korero/media.
- **Principle of action** we will collaborate across iwi communication channels, utilising the skills, capability and resources to come up with a plan on how we cand use this more effectively **Ngāti Toa to lead launch of Comms Collective**.

2. Rangatahi

- Being intentional with the inclusion of Rangatahi (and removing barriers to their inclusion)
- Vital to capture the whakaaro of Rangatahi through always involving them.
- Rangatahi Is Mana Motuhake & Rangatiratanga just doing the opposite of what the Crown wants?
- Participation requires pakeke acceptance and succession.
- Principle of action: We need to be intentional to ensure Rangatahi are participating in the korero and process
- Action: iwi will ensure that they have a plan in place to ensure Rangatahi participation.

3. Tikanga and Inclusiveness as a design principle

- Ensuring Tikanga and inclusiveness as a design principle from whanau, hapu, iwi
- Unlocking our spaces, Te Reo and Matauranga informed from the local level hapu and whanau.
- We need to be clear and ensure a shared understanding our tikanga and values.
- Undertaking community check in to ensure mana motuhake at a local level to ensure we know what is important to us
- Local issues we don't need others to tell us what to do the mana of whānau/hapū is for us alone to determine we must go back to our people to hear what is important from the W/H space so iwi are clear principles will be agreed, but this is a rolling Kaupapa. Tikanga frame is supported across the motu.
- What is an iwi lifestyle it is not what it is but what it could be. What do we want and what do we want to keep, change, chuck?
- How do we unify if we're not all on equal footing?
- **Principle of Action** Establishing our Tikanga world view as the base.
- Principle of Action Ensuring Inclusiveness as a foundational principle
- Action: Every Whanau Hapu Iwi will take the tono home to have the korero to achieve inclusiveness and shared understanding and approaches

4. Vehicle and framework for delivery

- Continue to clarify the vehicle and framework for delivery of our Kotahitanga vision.
- How to pull together Kotahitanga, how to maintain the momentum, how to get these whakaaro back to those that supported the hui a motu?
- Role of NICF? Strong signal from floor that NICF has not been successful in demonstrating or implementing Kotahitanga. Time for new something.
- Ongoing whare / hui taumata at a national level representation at all levels talking direct to the English Crown mana ki mana opportunity to wananga / advocate / decide at a national level.
- Collectivising actions What are these? All Māori stopping paying taxes to the kāwanatanga and instead pay it to the Rangatiratanga.
- The voice of Whanau and Hapu is vital.
- Stop giving life to the government.
- Looking at international partners (i.e. what is Canada doing).
- Te Matatini as a vehicle for Kotahitanga the framework is already there.
- Frame at home he toa Rangatira, whatever institution goes forward, all our whakapapa and linkages need to be built into this.
- Ensuring a Rural and Urban strategy both have different needs
- Unionisation and membership models could be explored
- Principle of Action A well-timed hui taumata that is based on Whanau Hapu Iwi whakaaro to pull this all together.

5. Keeping the momentum and energy

- Prevention plan to keep the momentum and energy going –
 we need to anticipate momentum loss.
- What is Kotahitanga and how do we maintain the korero for hapu and whanau.
- We need to be better at sharing.
- Kotahitanga cannot be periodic crisis driven

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- Climate change and managed retreat could be opportunities to leverage the DSP model but also need to be factored in to risks
- Food sovereignty is critical sharing resources with each other, "feeding" our own supermarkets through our own kai businesses
- Rate payers, those iwi with large land blocks, exploring ways to leverage with councils
- Exploring ways to pool capital and have share-holdings in banks or creating our own
- Using the DSP model to return Crown owned land to iwi to then be leased back

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
